Congress, whether publisher of a newspaper or his agent or any liquor dealer or his agent, is liable to \$1000 fine and imprisonment for six months. For any subsequent offense a year's imprisonment may be imposed.

Newspapers and magazine readers in dry territories are likely to receive their papers "censored" of liquor ads by the liberal use of shears on the part of news dealers. This practice is already in effect in Georgia.

Not only states which are completely dry but dry counties, towns and even wards in subdivisions of any state or city otherwise "wet" are closed to liquor advertising or soliciting by mail.




